Our Medical, Dental, and BTPA programs are off to a strong start with an amazing group of motivated students ready to take on the challenge of their new career endeavor.



Dental Assisting Program



The Dental Assisting program is in its second semester! Apprentices are continuing to build their skills through on-the-job training at their assigned clinics, complemented by classroom instruction every other Monday at SCCOE. At the same time, students in the traditional pathway have transitioned into their 240-hour externships, gaining real-world experience at local dental offices. Both groups are making great strides and are on track to graduate in late May 2025.

Medical Assisting Program

Medical Assisting Program

Medical Assisting students started the second semester in January with the clinical portion of the program. They learned hands-on clinical skills and were certified in Venipuncture, Phlebotomy, and First Aid/CPR. Students completed practicum hours with each other, instructors, and volunteers. Students have been in local medical clinics to complete their 180 externship hours. With 5 weeks to go until the end of the year, students are working very hard to complete their hours before they graduate at the end of May.

Building Trades Pre-Apprenticeship

The BTPA program continues to thrive with two additional cohorts this fall. Students who completed these cohorts received certification in MC3, OSHA 10, First Aid/CPR and are job-ready and employable. This 10-week, no-cost program is an intensive hands-on program designed to prepare adult students for entry into a fulfilling career with great potential for growth.

In partnership with Rountree, the CALS BTPA cohort is proud to have graduated 4 students at the end of March. Upon completion and release, these graduated students received a \$300 stipend and work boots to support their success in the trades industry. The CALS team also provides individual consultation that includes being referred to local agencies to seek employment.

The community program, located at the Santa Cruz COE, graduated 12 students in April. Students toured multiple employment industries, <u>Santa Cruz</u> <u>Waste Water Treatment Center</u>, Joby <u>Aviation</u> in Marina, and the <u>Tri-County</u> <u>Union</u> campus in Castroville. These tours exposed students to multiple employment opportunities in the trades industry. After graduating, students begin their application process to local unions and companies.

Wildland Fire Academy

The CALS team is excited about the growth of our Wildland Fire Academy. Working in partnership with CAL FIRE and California Conservation Corps, students complete training needed for an entrylevel firefighter position.





This collaboration has successfully provided students with practical, real-world firefighting experience in a structured learning environment.

In March, six students completed the rigorous program. Throughout their training, these individuals benefited from expert instruction that focused on developing the practical skills needed in the field.

Graduates mastered firefighting competencies including building effective fire lines, properly deploying fire shelters, safely handling equipment, performing mop up and patrol duties, and strengthening their teamwork and communication abilities. These foundational skills have prepared them for the demands of professional firefighting careers.

Sueños Program



The Sueños Program supports teenagers and young adults (ages 16 to 24) to develop workplace skills that will prepare them to enter and thrive in an increasingly competitive labor market. Sueños is a Santa Cruz COE program in partnership with the Workforce Development Board of Santa Cruz County.

We're excited to share that Sueños participants have been actively engaging in a variety of workshops designed to empower and prepare them for successful futures. 
These workshops are more than just educational, they're laying the foundation for confident, capable, and career-ready young adults.

Career Advancement Charter

The Career Advancement Charter (CAC) is an Independent Study program for adult learners to earn their high school diploma while gaining academic and technical skills that will lead to college and career readiness.

CAC Foundations Success Class:



CAC Foundations Success Class is designed to help and encourage students to succeed in their high school diploma program. This course gives students the opportunity to learn new skills or strengthen the ones they already have. A main focus is teaching students how to effectively use Google Suite tools, including Google Docs, Google Forms, and Google Spreadsheets, which are essential for completing school assignments and staying organized. Students also practice their writing skills by working on assignments such as an autobiographical essay, which helps them reflect on their experiences and express themselves more clearly.

The class also introduces students to the Cyber High learning platform, where they are assigned a subject to study independently from home, helping them get comfortable with online learning. Beyond academics, the course supports students in developing social skills and building self-confidence, especially when speaking in front of others. Overall, the CAC Foundations Success Class is a great starting point for new CAC students, helping them feel more prepared, supported, and confident as they begin their independent study journey.

CAC Orientation for New Students:



In an effort to better serve our students, the CAC has implemented a new student orientation, registration and enrollment process. New students attend an in-person orientation session designed to inform them of all the services and community partnerships the CAC offers. CAC South County Orientations take place on a bimonthly basis at our Sequoia Schools site. Orientation is designed to help students be successful from day 1 and beyond.

During the orientation, students complete registration and assessment activities. Following orientation, students engage in the CAC Foundations Success Program that spans five weeks. The Foundations Success Program is designed to help students learn essential skills that will support their transition into our Independent Study high school diploma program.



Evening Child Care (ECC): In an effort to support our adult learner parents, we offer childcare services four days a week at our South County school site. Our childcare center operates Monday through Thursday from 3pm to 7pm on a weekly basis. Our staff engages with children in a variety of learning and enrichment activities.



Sequoia Schools Community Evening



CAC ESL Class: We are excited to continue to offer English as a Second Language (ESL) classes to CAC students and community members. ESL classes are offered every **Tuesday and Wednesday from 5:15pm to 7:00pm** at Sequoia Schools. The advanced-level class takes place every Wednesday, and the beginning-level class every Tuesday. Upon enrollment, students take an evaluation for placement into their appropriate level.

Adult Learning Enrichment Opportunities: All students enrolled in the CAC have the opportunity to participate in a variety of evening courses, ranging from culinary arts, to hands-on math tutoring, to ESL support classes. CAC students also have the option to pursue Dual Enrollment or non-credit career education classes at Cabrillo College. Additionally, we are pleased to share that we continue to offer work-readiness and job skills certification opportunities to our students through Certiport.

CAC Community Events: Our team recently hosted Know Your Rights Trainings in South County, providing valuable information and resources to adult students and their families. We are excited to offer the same opportunity in North County in the coming weeks. In addition, South County adult students and their families participated in a vibrant Family Resource Fair in partnership with Second Harvest Food Bank. Nearly 50 families attended the event and were able to take home bags of fresh food and essential items.





Sequoia Schools Community Evening



Plazas Comunitarias: CAC is proud to partner with the Watsonville Public Library, INEA (Instituto Nacional para la Educación de los Adultos) and the Mexican Consulate to offer free basic skills education classes in Spanish, known as Plaza Comunitaria. The Plaza Comunitaria classes aim to help adult learners that have immigrated from a Spanish-speaking country finish or begin their elementary or secondary education in Spanish. In addition, interested students develop the skills necessary to pass high school equivalency exams (GED) in Spanish or to enroll in the CAC as a high school student to earn a high school diploma. Please share this information with your students and their families and any other community partners/agencies/businesses that may benefit from this resource. Classes are offered at Sequoia Schools 229 Green Valley Rd. Freedom and at the Watsonville Public Library. For more information call 831-768-3410.

PSC North & South County: The CAC program partners with the Probation and Corrections of Santa Cruz County to support those taking steps to fulfill their high school education. The Probation Success Center or PSC are places where high school teachers offer math, computer literacy, and English classes along with 1–1 tutoring for students to prepare for high school equivalency exams. Students can choose either path for achievement and receive credits towards their high school diploma as they study. The Independent Study program is an integral part since most clients are also using the PSC for other resources such as job search, counseling, parenting courses and more.





Bay Area Community College Consortium

The BACCC comprises 28 colleges and their framework is to facilitate, collaborate, plan, manage, communicate, and inform their local education agencies (LEA's) about career education programs. It creates career pathways through collaborations with the K12 and Adult Education Consortia partners to prepare students for high-demand, livable wages.
