Natalie Stoff (Saint Francis High School student) noted that student disengagement and absenteeism are growing concerns and encouraged creating more inclusive spaces.

Jose Lopez Muñoz (Santa Cruz County Office of Education student) shared that improving student engagement is essential and emphasized the need to enhance math class structures to better support learning.

Americo Castillo (Santa Cruz City Schools student) stressed the importance of maintaining equity among classes, schools, and across the county.

Desi Salinas-Holz (Pajaro Valley Unified School District student) underscored the importance of ensuring equitable opportunities for all students.

Amy Vasquez Ortiz (Pajaro Valley Unified School District student) emphasized the importance of seeking and incorporating student input and voice.

Magdalena Orozco Monjarras (Pajaro Valley Unified School District student) shared that giving school a greater sense of purpose can help improve student engagement.

#### 10.1 <u>Announcement of Personnel Commission Board-Appointed Vacancy</u>

In accordance with Personnel Commission rules and regulations, the Santa Cruz County Board of Trustees is responsible for appointing one commissioner to serve a three-year term. A vacancy occurred following the passing of Commissioner Lawrence Lane in September 2025. The unexpired term extends through December 2026.

Recruitment to fill the vacancy was opened, and one application was received from Murry Schekman. Pursuant to legal requirements, the Board must hold a public hearing no sooner than 30 days and no later than 45 days following this announcement of its intended appointee. After the public hearing, the Board may proceed with the appointment to fill the unexpired term.

# 10.2 <u>Presentation on COE's Role in Advancing Al Education and Integration in Schools and Districts</u>

Jason Borgen, Chief Technology & Innovations Officer (CTiO), and Stephanie Sumarna, EdTech & Innovation Coach, Tech+ Division, presented an overview of initiatives supporting schools and districts in the ethical and effective use of Artificial Intelligence (AI). The presentation covered educator training, curriculum support for AI literacy, and collaboration with district leaders to promote equitable integration. Emphasis was placed on enhancing teaching, learning, and efficiency while protecting student data privacy and instructional integrity.

#### 10.3 <u>Presentation on Support Efforts to Ensure Continuity of Encompass Community</u> Services' Head Start Program

Dr. Faris Sabbah, County Superintendent of Schools, provided an update on efforts to sustain the federally funded Head Start program operated by Encompass Community Services, which serves over 250 low-income children across 15 classrooms. Facing potential closure due to reduced federal funding, the COE, in partnership with the County of Santa Cruz and First 5 Santa Cruz County, secured interim funding to maintain services through October 31, 2025, while pursuing long-term solutions with federal partners.

The County Office of Education (COE) currently owns a vehicle that is no longer operational and/or is no longer fit to transport students. The vehicle concerned is listed below:

• 2007 Ford Explore VIN#1FMEU63EX7UB62270

It would take significant resources and funding to repair or repurpose, and it has been determined that they could not be sold for enough funds to offset the cost of a sale. The administration recommends the board vote to dispose of the vehicles to a recycling organization or donation to avoid additional costs to the County Office, consistent with line item 4 of the attached policy:

"Surplus personal property that the County Superintendent and the County Board agree to be of insufficient value to defray the cost of arranging a sale shall be disposed of in the most efficient manner not inconsistent with the Education Code."

Per board policy 3260, the board must evaluate and vote on the disposal method for the vehicle.

#### OTHER DISPOSITION OF SURPLUS PERSONAL PROPERTY

The Santa Cruz County Superintendent of Schools (County Superintendent) may sell or otherwise dispose of any personal property that he/she declares surplus to the needs of the Santa Cruz County Office of Education (SCCOE), through a process consistent with Education Code.

Personal property is defined as instructional materials, equipment, relocatable buildings, supplies, vehicles, and other such items.

The following shall be the order in which disposal is accomplished.

- 1. The County Superintendent is required to certify the value of the property in a report to the Santa Cruz County Board of Education (County Board) for its review.
- 2. Offer the property at fair market value to all school districts within Santa Cruz County.
- 3. Conduct a public sale at fair market value.
- 4. Surplus personal property that the County Superintendent and the County Board agree to be of insufficient value to defray the cost of arranging a sale shall be disposed of in the most efficient manner not inconsistent with the Education Code.

For surplus personal property estimated to be over \$25,000 that belongs to SCCOE, the County Superintendent is required by law to:

- 1. Obtain an independent evaluation of the property.
- 2. Bring the proposed sale to the attention of the County Board for its approval.
- 3. Advertise property for sale in a newspaper of general circulation for no less than one week.

### WILLIAMS SETTLEMENT LEGISLATION

### ANNUAL REPORT FOR SANTA CRUZ COUNTY OFFICE BOARD OF EDUCATION 2025-2026 FISCAL YEAR

The Williams Settlement Legislation requires the County Superintendent of Schools to annually monitor and report on schools ranked by the CDE as CSI/ATSI, Teacher Credentialing Issues, and Graduation Rate (California Department of Education's Website) https://www.cde.ca.gov/eo/ce/wc/wmsschools.asp

The Santa Cruz County Superintendent of Schools and staff at the Santa Cruz County Office of Education are responsible for:

- 1. Determining if students have "sufficient" standards-aligned instructional materials in four core subjects areas (English language arts, mathematics, history/social science and science), including science laboratory equipment in grades 9-12, and, as appropriate, in foreign languages, and health;
- 2. Determining if there is any facility condition that "poses an emergency or urgent threat to the health or safety of pupils or staff";
- 3. Determining if the school has provided accurate data on the annual School Accountability Report Card (SARC) related to the sufficiency of instructional materials and the safety, cleanliness, and adequacy of school facilities;
- 4. Ensuring that a Uniform Complaint Process (UCP) policy is in use and UCP notices are posted in all classrooms and in administrative offices; and
- 5. Determining if there are any Teacher Mis-Assignments or Teacher Vacancies at these schools.

This report presents the results of our visits and review at Pajaro Valley Unified School District, Santa Cruz City Schools, San Lorenzo Unified, Pacific District, Scotts Valley Unified, Soquel Elementary District and SCCOE for the period of August - October 2025. The following schools were visited, and a complete Site Summary Report and Facilities Inspection Tool for each school has been included with this annual Report for submission to Districts and COE Board Members and Superintendents.

### Our findings for each are as follows: Instructional Materials

The team found that all students had access to sufficient instructional materials, including textbooks, in the core subject areas (including science laboratory materials at the secondary schools). All nineteen schools reviewed for instructional materials/textbook sufficiency fully complied with the Williams settlement. Any shortages had already been addressed via purchase orders.

### **Facility Inspections**

Utilizing the Facilities Inspection Tool (FIT), as developed by the Office of Public Schools Construction to determine if a school facility is in "good repair" as defined by Education Code (EC) Section 17002(d)(1) and to rate the facility pursuant to EC Section 17002(d)(2), a school facilities inspection was completed at each school site. Our visiting team reviewed the previous year's FIT reports, annual FIT reports submitted by the district, and inspected restrooms, common areas, kitchen/multipurpose facilities, and 25% of the school classrooms. No schools pose an emergency or urgent threat to the health or safety of pupils or staff.

### **School Accountability Report Cards (SARC)**

The Williams Settlement included language regarding the accuracy of data reported in the School Accountability Report Card (SARC). The 2023-2024 SARCs for each school are available on the District websites. SARCs accurately reflect the findings by the *Williams* committee members.

### Teacher Assignments/Mis-assignments

During our visit, the 2025-2026 Master Schedule or Teacher Assignment Listing was collected and has been submitted to the Santa Cruz County Office of Education Human Resources Department for their annual review. The Human Resources department in Districts have worked collaboratively with the Santa Cruz County Office of Education to ensure that teachers are appropriately credentialed and placed in the correct teaching assignments.

### **Uniform Complaint Process**

All classrooms must have the Uniform Complaint Process Classroom Notice posted. The team found that of the 25% of classrooms visited at each site, all had current notices posted in both Spanish and English.






### Santa Cruz County CAASPP ELA 2018-2025

#### Santa Cruz County Office of Education – Personnel Commission

#### **Purpose and Legal Foundation:**

The Personnel Commission (PC) operates under California Education Code Sections 45100–45460, which establish a merit system for classified employees in public education. Specifically, Education Code Section 45260 authorizes the Commission to "prescribe, amend, and interpret rules as necessary to ensure the efficiency of the service and the selection and retention of employees upon a basis of merit and fitness."

The Santa Cruz County Office of Education (COE) Personnel Commission ensures that hiring, promotion, and employment practices for classified staff are conducted in a fair, open, and merit-based manner, independent of influence.

#### **Core Responsibilities**

The Personnel Commission is responsible for:

- Establishing and maintaining classification plans for all classified positions.
- Recruiting, testing, and certifying qualified candidates through examinations and eligibility lists.
- Ensuring equity and compliance in hiring, compensation, and employment practices.
- Interpreting and applying Merit System Rules to uphold transparency and accountability in personnel actions.

These functions are carried out collaboratively with COE Human Resources, ensuring legal compliance, operational efficiency, and fairness for all classified employees.

#### Why the Personnel Commission Exists

Historically, Personnel Commissions were created to replace "spoils" or "patronage" systems in which employment decisions were based on political favoritism. The Merit System instead guarantees:

- Equal opportunity for applicants.
- Selection based solely on ability, knowledge, and skills.
- Protection against arbitrary employment actions.
- Consistent and objective personnel practices that serve the \*public trust\*.

#### **Composition and Meetings**

The COE Personnel Commission is a three-member body—one appointed by the Board of Education, one by the classified employees, and a third selected jointly by the other two commissioners.

Meetings are held monthly, on the third Tuesday, at 400 Encinal Street, Santa Cruz, CA 95060. These meetings are open to the public and subject to Brown Act regulation.

#### **Benefits of the Merit System**

For managers and departments, the Personnel Commission provides:

- Clearly defined job classifications aligned with organizational needs.
- Qualified candidate pools screened through objective assessments.
- Standardized and defensible hiring and pay practices.
- Expert HR guidance that ensures compliance with all relevant laws and regulations.

By maintaining these standards, the Personnel Commission helps the COE uphold its mission to provide efficient, equitable, and high-quality educational services to the community.

On August 21, 2025, Trustees Rachel Williams and Sue Roth were appointed to the Superintendent's Compensation Subcommittee to review available data related to the Superintendent's salary and make a recommendation to the Board to coincide with the 2026 calendar year. The Compensation Subcommittee followed the salary setting guidelines as set forth by Administrative Regulation 4360.

#### **Background**

Dr. Faris Sabbah has dedicated over 25 years to education, serving in roles from instructional aide to university professor. He has held key leadership positions, including Director of Migrant Education in the Pajaro Valley Unified School District and Deputy Superintendent at the Santa Cruz County Office of Education, where he was elected as County Superintendent in November 2018. Dr. Sabbah's career reflects a deep commitment to equity, access, and student-centered learning across diverse educational settings.

The Salary of the Santa Cruz County Superintendent of Schools has not been reviewed since 2018.

The Santa Cruz County Board of Education must determine the salary schedule and placement of the County Superintendent per Education Code 1209.

#### **Process**

To meet established guidelines, the Chief Human Resources Officer of the Santa Cruz County Office of Education conducted a superintendent salary study, which was certified by the Deputy Superintendent of Business. A detailed report was then prepared for the Compensation Subcommittee. On October 6, 2025, the Subcommittee met with both the Chief Human

Resources Officer and the Deputy Superintendent of Business to review the findings. Based on this analysis, the Subcommittee developed a recommendation for the County Board of Education, proposing a five-step salary schedule. This schedule was created using a formula based on the average salaries of superintendents from the San Mateo County Office of Education, Monterey County Office of Education, Santa Cruz City Schools, and Pajaro Valley Unified School District.

#### Recommendation

The recommendation of the Superintendent's Compensation Subcommittee is to revise the County Superintendent's salary schedule as shown below.

Step I is created by taking the mean average of the comparison group determined by AR 4360.

Each annual salary step increase thereafter includes a 2.5% increase.

It is recommended that Superintendent Sabbah be placed on Step I of the salary schedule for the calendar year 2026, and advanced on the salary schedule annually, effective January 1st.

The County Superintendent will receive current and subsequent benefits that are granted to management employees of SCCOE. These currently include health and welfare benefits, longevity, master's and doctorate stipends, car and cell phone allowances.

#### **RECOMMENDED ACTION:**

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S PROPOSED SALARY COMPENSATION AND BENEFITS

The Santa Cruz County Board of Education shall establish the salary and compensation for the County Superintendent of Schools. The Board will periodically review the salary and compensation for needed changes or adjustments.

Compensation will include both salary and additional benefits. The salary portion of the compensation package will be determined by a formula based on the average of current salaries of selected superintendents in the region. The superintendent's salary will be determined by averaging the current salaries of the superintendents at the San Mateo County Office of Education, the Monterey County Office of Education, and the Santa Cruz City Schools District, and the Pajaro Valley Unified School District. The Superintendent, serving full time, shall receive the average of the selected superintendents' compensation as calculated on February 15. The current salaries of the regional superintendents as well as the average of those salaries will be certified by the Associate or Assistant Superintendent of Business Services each calendar year and provided to the Santa Cruz County Board of Education for review prior to compensation adjustments.

- **Section 5.** SCCOE staff is hereby authorized and directed, jointly and severally, to do any and all things which they may deem necessary or advisable in order to consummate the transactions

#### **ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE (AI)**

The County Board of Education recognizes the transformative potential of artificial intelligence (AI) to increase student access to information, support teacher effectiveness, and facilitate the administration of student assessments, as well as the potential for AI to undermine student achievement, health, and well-being. Therefore, the County Board is committed to supporting the use of AI by students and staff in accordance with the following principles:

- 1. Student-Centered: AI should be used to personalize and enhance the learning experience for each student and to support digital citizenship and literacy
- 2. Staff-Centered: AI should be used as a tool to augment and support, rather than replace, staff in the performance of their duties and responsibilities
- 3. Ethical Use and Transparency: AI should be used ethically and transparently by all staff and students, with careful consideration of potential biases, and in compliance with all applicable intellectual property and copyright laws
- 4. Accountability and Responsibility: AI should be used in a manner that ensures accountability by those who use it and that those who use it are responsible for such use, including when and how it is used
- 5. Equity and Access: AI should be implemented in a manner that ensures equitable access and opportunity for all students, regardless of background or ability, and for all schools across the COE
- 6. Secure and Private: The COE should prioritize security and privacy when changing existing practices or adopting new practices regarding AI
- 7. Professional Development: The COE should provide ongoing professional development for staff in all aspects of AI, with a particular focus on the ethical and responsible use of AI
- 8. Community Engagement: The COE should engage with the community to share these principles, to educate the community on AI, and to discuss the permitted and prohibited uses of AI in the COE
- 9. Continuous Improvement: The COE should regularly evaluate the use of AI by students and staff, and adapting its policies, procedures, and professional development to align with best practices and evolving technologies

The use of AI in the COE shall be consistent with this policy, County Board Policy 0440 - County Office of Education Technology Plan, County Board Policy/Exhibit (1) 4040 - Acceptable Use of Technology, County Board Policy 5131.9 - Academic Honesty, County Board Policy 6154 - Homework/Makeup Work, County Board Policy 6162.5 - Student Assessment, and County Board Policy/Exhibit (1) 6163.4 - Student Use of Technology.

#### RELEASE OF DIRECTORY INFORMATION

The Santa Cruz County Board of Education (Board) recognizes the importance of maintaining the confidentiality of directory information and therefore authorizes the release of such information only in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

The Superintendent or designee may release student directory information to representatives of the news media or nonprofit organizations in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation.

(cf. 1112 - Media Relations)

The Superintendent or designee may limit or deny the release of specific categories of directory information to any public or private nonprofit organization based on a determination of the best interests of County Office of Education (COE) students. (Education Code 49073)

A student's directory information shall only be included in the minutes of the County Board's meeting in accordance with County Board Bylaw 9324 - Minutes and Recordings.

Colleges and prospective employers, including military recruiters, shall have access to directory information. Military recruiters Both shall have access to a student's name, address, email address, and telephone number, unless the parent/guardian, or student, if the student is 18 years of age or older, has specified that the information not be released in accordance with law and administrative regulation. (20 USC 7908; 10 USC 503; Education Code 49603)

Under no circumstances shall directory information be disclosed to a private profit-making entity, except for representatives of the news media and prospective employers, in accordance with law, County Board policy, and administrative regulation. Private schools and colleges may be given the names and addresses of 12th-grade students and students who are no longer enrolled, provided that they use this information only for purposes directly related to the institution's academic or professional goals. (Education Code 49073)

**Students** 

The County Board of Education is committed to working with the County Superintendent of Schools to provide a safe school environment that allows all students equal access and opportunities in academic and other educational support programs, services, and activities. Unlawful discrimination against a student in any county office of education (COE) school, program, or activity, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, and bullying, is prohibited. Any form of retaliation against an individual who files or otherwise participates in the filing or investigation of a complaint or report regarding an incident of discrimination is also prohibited.

NONDISCRIMINATION/HARASSMENT

(cf. 0410 - Nondiscrimination in County Office Programs and Activities) (cf. 5145.7 - Sexual Harassment)

This policy shall apply to all acts related to school activity or to school attendance occurring within a COE school or program, and to acts which occur off campus or outside of school-related or school-sponsored activities but which may have an impact or create a hostile environment at school.

Unlawful discrimination includes physical, verbal, nonverbal, or written conduct based on a student's actual or perceived race, color, ancestry, nationality, national origin, immigration status, ethnic group identification, ethnicity, age, religion, marital status, pregnancy, parental status, physical or mental disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, gender expression, medical condition, or genetic information, or the student's association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics. Unlawful discrimination also includes the creation of a hostile environment when the prohibited conduct is so severe, persistent, or pervasive that it affects a student's ability to participate in or benefit from an educational program or activity; creates an intimidating, threatening, hostile, or offensive educational environment; has the effect of substantially or unreasonably interfering with a student's academic performance; or otherwise adversely affects a student's educational opportunities.

Unlawful discrimination also includes discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying, of students based on one of the categories above with respect to the provision of opportunities to participate in any COE school, program, or activity, or the provision or receipt of educational benefits or services, such as prohibiting a student from enrolling in a class or course on the basis of the student's sex.

When, as permitted by law, the COE maintains sex-segregated facilities, such as restrooms and locker rooms, or sex-segregated programs and activities, such as physical education classes, intermural sports, and interscholastic athletic programs, students shall be allowed to access facilities and participate in programs and activities, class discussions, yearbook pictures, and field trips consistent with their gender identity. Each student's gender identity shall be the gender

asserted by the student. Transgender and gender-nonconforming students shall be afforded the same rights, benefits, and protections as all COE students.

Complaints alleging unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying, or retaliation may be filed in accordance with the County Board's uniform complaint procedures and the processes established by the County Superintendent for investigating and resolving such complaints. Regardless of whether a complainant complies with the writing, timeline, and/or other formal filing requirements, all complaints alleging unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying, shall be investigated and prompt action shall be taken to stop the discrimination, prevent recurrence, and address any continuing effect on students

(cf. 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures)

Students who engage in unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying, or retaliation in violation of law, County Board policy, or other related COE procedures shall be subject to appropriate consequence or discipline, which may include suspension or expulsion when the behavior is severe or pervasive as defined in Education Code 48900.4.

Because unlawful discrimination could occur when disciplining students, including suspension and expulsion, discipline shall be enforced in a fair, consistent, and non-discriminatory manner. When appropriate based on the severity or pervasiveness of the bullying, the parents/guardians of victims and perpetrators shall be notified and law enforcement may be contacted.

When a student has been suspended, or other means of correction have been implemented against the student for an incident of racist bullying, harassment, or intimidation, the school administrator, or designee may engage both the victim and perpetrator in a restorative justice practice suitable to the needs of the students. The school administrator, or designee may also require the perpetrator to engage in a culturally sensitive program that promotes racial justice and equity and combats racism and ignorance and may regularly check on the victim to ensure that the victim is not in danger of suffering from any long-lasting mental health issues. (Education Code 48900.5)

# Record-Keeping

A record of all reported cases of unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying, shall be maintained to enable the COE to monitor, address, and prevent repetitive prohibited behavior in COE schools.

# **County Superintendent's Antidiscrimination Measures**

The County Board hereby incorporates by reference the policies, procedures, and measures implemented by the County Superintendent to prevent or address unlawful discrimination in COE schools, programs, and activities, including, but not limited to, the following:

- 1. Designation of a coordinator/compliance officer to handle complaints alleging unlawful discrimination
- 2. Posting of information regarding Title IX prohibitions against discrimination based on a student's sex, gender, gender identity, pregnancy, and parental status in a prominent and conspicuous location on the COE's web site, as required pursuant to Education Code 221.61
- 3. Publicizing of the COE's nondiscrimination policies and complaint procedures
- 4. Provision of training and information about the COE's nondiscrimination policies and complaint procedures, including information related to state and federal laws pertaining to the rights of transgender and gender-nonconforming students, to students, parents/guardians, COE employees, and others as applicable
- 5. Establishment of a complaint process that ensures a prompt and fair resolution of complaints
- 6. Provision of annual notification required by law.
- 7. Maintenance of student records in accordance with law

#### SEXUAL HARASSMENT

The County Board of Education is committed to maintaining a safe school environment that is free from harassment and discrimination. Sexual harassment targeted at any student in a county office of education (COE) educational program, school, or school-sponsored or school-related activity is prohibited. The County Board also prohibits retaliatory behavior or action against any person who reports, files a complaint or testifies about, or otherwise supports a complainant in alleging sexual harassment.

The County Board strongly encourages students who feel that they are being or have been sexually harassed on school grounds or at a school-sponsored or school-related activity by another student or an adult, or who have experienced an off-campus sexual harassment incident that involved anyone with whom they may continue to have contact on campus, to immediately contact their teacher, the principal or program administrator, or any other available school employee. Any employee who receives a report or observes an incident of sexual harassment shall notify the County Superintendent of Schools or the COE's designated compliance officer so that steps may be taken to investigate and address the allegation in accordance with law and related County Superintendent regulation.

## **Instruction/Information**

All COE students shall receive age-appropriate information on sexual harassment. Such instruction and information shall include:

- 1. What acts and behavior constitute sexual harassment, including the fact that sexual harassment could occur between people of the same sex and could involve sexual violence
- 2. A clear message that students do not have to endure sexual harassment under any circumstance
- 3. Encouragement to report observed incidents of sexual harassment even when the alleged victim of the harassment has not complained
- 4. A clear message that student safety is the COE's primary concern, and that any separate rule violation involving an alleged victim or any other person reporting a sexual harassment incident will be addressed separately and will not affect the manner in which the sexual harassment complaint will be received, investigated, or resolved
- 5. A clear message that, regardless of a complainant's noncompliance with the writing, timeline, or other formal filing requirements, every sexual harassment allegation that involves a student, whether as the complainant, respondent, or victim of the harassment,

- shall be investigated and action shall be taken to respond to the harassment, prevent recurrence, and address any continuing effect on students
- 6. Information about the COE's procedures for investigating complaints and the person(s) to whom a report of sexual harassment should be made
- 7. Information about the rights of students and parents/guardians to file a civil or criminal complaint, as applicable, including the right to file a civil or criminal complaint while the COE investigation of a sexual harassment complaint continues
- 8. A clear message that, when needed, the COE will implement supportive measures to ensure a safe school environment for a student who is the complainant or victim of sexual harassment and/or other students during an investigation

# **Complaint Process and Disciplinary Actions**

Sexual harassment complaints by and against students shall be investigated and resolved in accordance with law and COE uniform complaint procedures. All complaints and allegations of sexual harassment shall be kept confidential except as necessary to carry out the investigation or take other subsequent necessary action. (5 CCR 4964)

Upon investigation of a sexual harassment complaint, any student found to have engaged in sexual harassment or sexual violence in violation of this County Board policy shall be subject to disciplinary action. For students in grades 4-12, disciplinary action may include suspension and/or expulsion.

#### **Notifications**

A copy of the COE's sexual harassment policy and regulation shall:

- 1. Be included in the notifications that are sent to parents/guardians at the beginning of each school year (Education Code 48980; 5 CCR 4917)
- 2. Be displayed in a prominent location in the main administrative building or other area where notices of COE rules, regulations, procedures, and standards of conduct are posted (Education Code 231.5)
- 3. Be posted on COE and program/school web sites and, when available, on COE-supported social media
- 4. Be provided as part of any orientation program conducted for new students at the beginning of each quarter, semester, or summer session (Education Code 231.5)
- 5. Appear in any publication that sets forth the program/school's or COE's comprehensive rules, regulations, procedures, and standards of conduct (Education Code 231.5)

6. Be provided to the County Superintendent for distribution to employees and employee organizations

# Record-Keeping

Records shall be maintained in accordance with law, including in accordance with Exhibit (1) 5145.71 - Title IX Sexual Harassment Complaint Procedures, and COE policies and regulations, of all reported cases of sexual harassment to enable the COE to monitor, address, and prevent repetitive harassing behavior in COE schools.

# RECOGNITION OF RELIGIOUS BELIEFS AND CUSTOMS

The County Board of Education recognizes that students' education would be incomplete without an understanding of the role of religion in society. As appropriate for a particular course, teachers may objectively discuss the influences of various religions, using religious works and symbols to illustrate their relationship with culture, literature or the arts. The Board expects that such instruction will identify principles common to all religions and foster respect for the diversity of religions and customs in the world and be consistent with the adopted instructional materials and state standards, as applicable.

The Board honors the rich cultural diversity of our students and our community. For many students in our schools, the observance of religious and cultural traditions is an important part of their personal, family, and community life. These traditions help the students understand and preserve their own value systems, cultures, customs and history.

In order to ensure that all students and families have the opportunity to participate in school activities, extracurricular and co-curricular activities and special events, the Board, in coordination with the Superintendent, shall also adopt an annual holiday calendar and a shorter list of "Observances That May Impact Attendance." Schools shall avoid scheduling exams, athletic events/contests and other special events, such as assemblies, field trips, and back-to-school nights, on days identified as "Observances That May Impact Attendance." The list of "Observances That May Impact Attendance" shall include:

- Rosh Hashanah
- Yom Kippur
- Good Friday
- Christmas
- Eid-al-Fitr
- Eid-al-Adha
- Birth of Baha'u'llah
- Naw Ruz
- Diwali

This list may be amended with Board approval.

In order to respect each student's individual right to freedom of religious practice, religious indoctrination is clearly forbidden in the public schools. Instruction about religion shall not promote or denigrate the beliefs or customs of any particular religion or sect, nor should a preference be shown for one religious viewpoint over another. Staff members shall be highly sensitive to their obligation not to interfere with the religious development of any student in whatever tradition the student embraces.

Staff shall not endorse, encourage or solicit religious or anti-religious expression or activities among students during class time. As part of their official duties, staff shall not lead students in prayer or other religious activities. However, staff shall not prohibit or discourage any student from praying or otherwise expressing his/her religious belief as long as this does not disrupt the classroom.

Students may express their beliefs about religion in their homework, artwork and other class work if the expression is germane to the assignment. Such work shall be judged by ordinary academic standards.

While teaching about religious holidays is a permissible part of the educational program, celebrating religious holidays is not allowed in the public schools. School-sponsored programs shall not be, nor have the effect of being, religiously oriented or a religious celebration. School and classroom decorations may express seasonal themes that are not religious in nature.

Music, art, literature or drama programs having religious themes are permitted as part of the curriculum for school-sponsored activities and programs if presented in an objective manner and as a traditional part of the cultural and religious heritage. The use of religious symbols that are part of a religious holiday is permitted as a teaching aid or resource provided that such symbols are displayed as an example of cultural and religious heritage of the holiday and are temporary in nature.

COE schools shall not prohibit religious activities if the same or similar non-religious activities are permitted.

When required by law, parents/guardians shall be notified that they may, via written request, opt their students out of instruction on the basis of their religious beliefs as specified in the accompanying administrative regulation. Students whose parents/guardians opt them out of such instruction may be offered an alternative activity of similar educational value. Additionally, a student shall not be subject to disciplinary action, academic penalty, or other sanction on the grounds that the student was opted out of such instruction.
