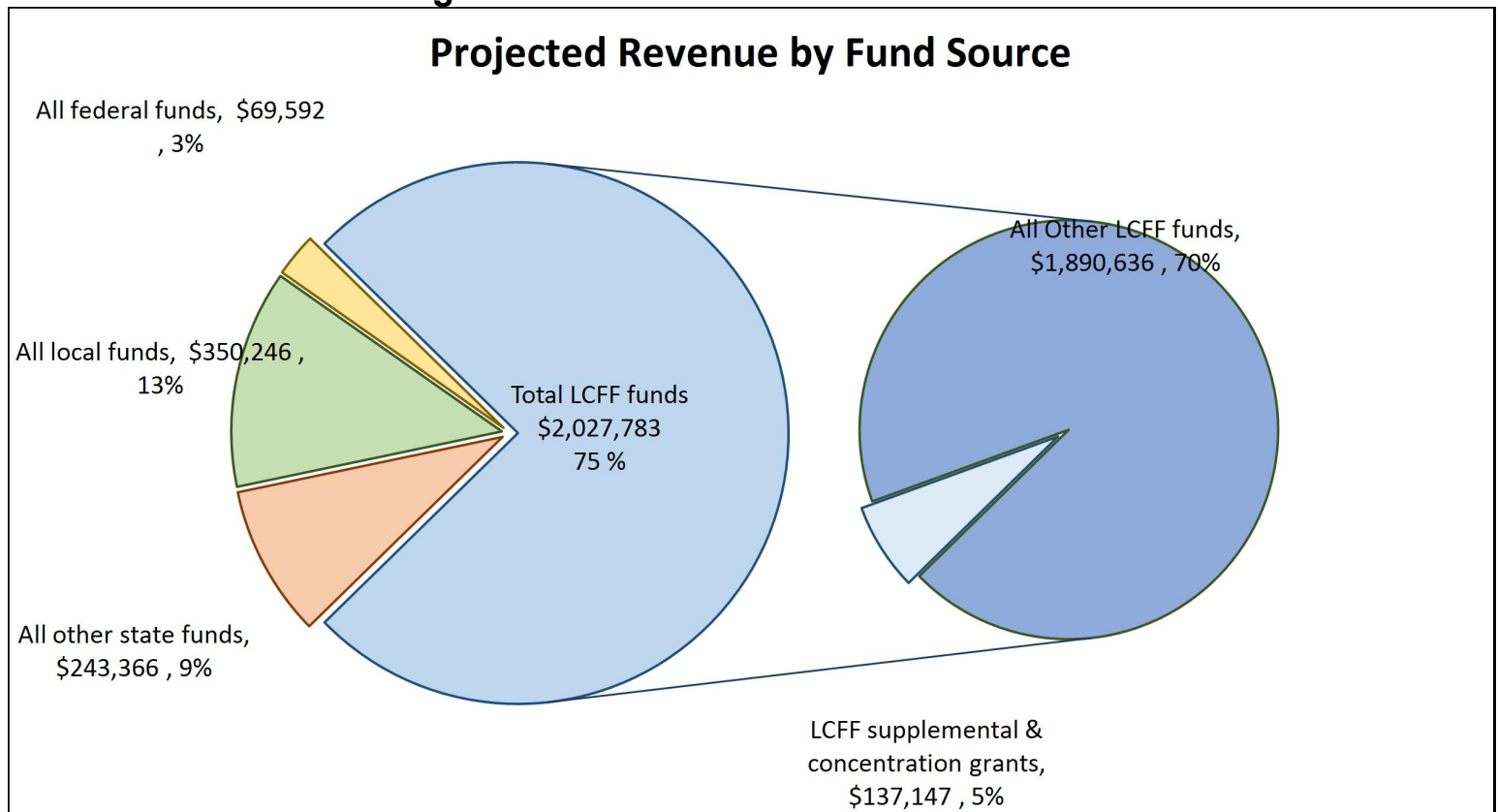

Budget Overview for the 2025-26 School Year

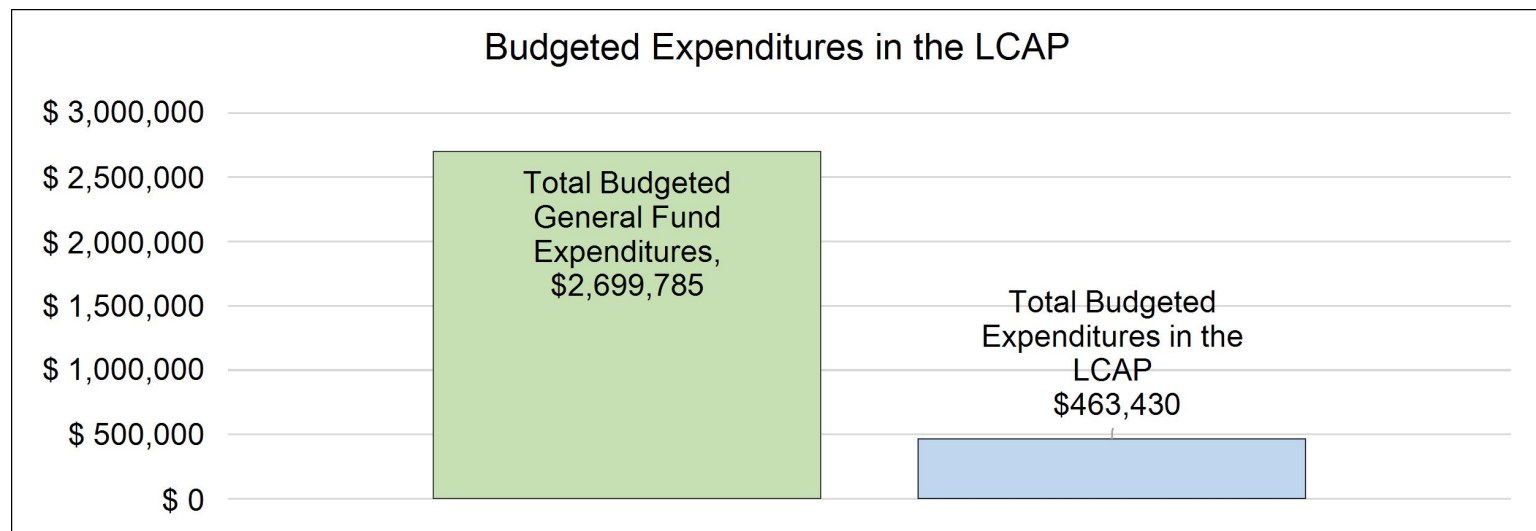


This chart shows the total general purpose revenue Pacific Elementary School District expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

The text description for the above chart is as follows: The total revenue projected for Pacific Elementary School District is \$2,690,987, of which \$2,027,783 is Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), \$243,366 is other state funds, \$350,246 is local funds, and \$69,592 is federal funds. Of the \$2,027,783 in LCFF Funds, \$137,147 is generated based on the enrollment of high needs students (foster youth, English learner, and low-income students).

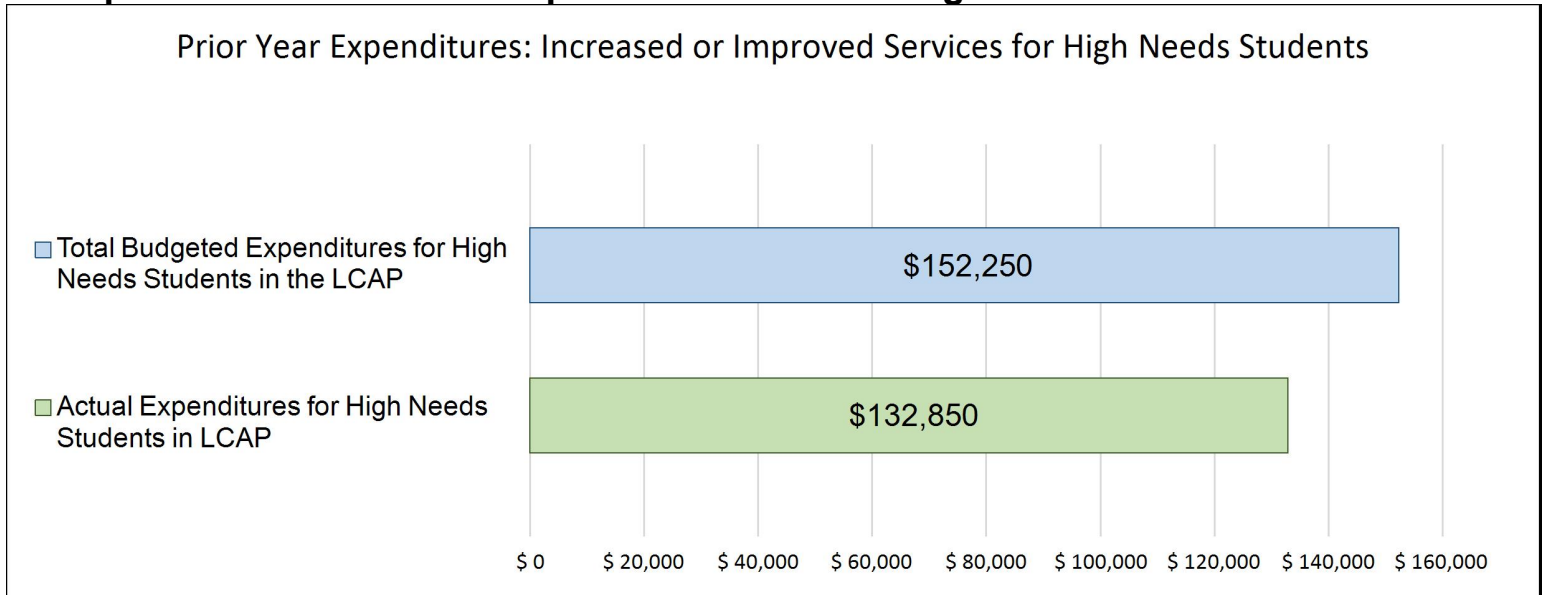
Some of the major areas of the budget that are not included in the LCAP are: construction, most facilities, special education, administration, most food services, and general operating costs.

Increased or Improved Services for High Needs Students in the LCAP for the 2025-26 School Year

In 2025-26, Pacific Elementary School District is projecting it will receive \$137147 based on the enrollment of foster youth, English learner, and low-income students. The text description of the above chart is as follows: In 2024-25, Pacific Elementary School District's LCAP budgeted \$152,250 for planned actions to increase or improve services for high needs students. Pacific Elementary School District actually spent \$132,850 for actions to increase or improve services for high needs students in 2024-25.

The difference between the budgeted and actual expenditures of \$19,400 had the following impact on Pacific Elementary School District's ability to increase or improve services for high needs students:

The main reason that actual expenditures were less than the budgeted expenditures is that services were less expensive than expected. Pacific, however, still achieved the major goals and met most of the metrics.

Plan Summary [2025-26]

General Information

A description of the LEA, its schools, and its students in grades transitional kindergarten–12, as applicable to the LEA. LEAs may also provide information about their strategic plan, vision, etc.

Founded in 1906, Pacific Elementary School serves approximately 180 preschool through sixth grade children. Demographically, the student enrollment is approximately 6% English learners, 0% Foster Youth, 2% migrant, 10% Special Education, 4% Section 504 plans, 7% Gifted And Talented (GATE), 11% homeless, and 44% qualify for Free/Reduced-priced meals. It is located in the town of Davenport, California, about ten miles north of Santa Cruz.

Pacific is proud to sponsor several unique signature programs, which make it a leader in innovative experiential learning.

First, the coordinated Life Lab (school garden) and FoodLab (school meals) programs have received numerous rewards and national and international attention. Together, the two programs teach students of all ages nutrition, gardening, life science, healthy eating, and cooking skills. The youngest students begin with simple gardening tasks and assisting with preparing and cleaning up healthy snacks and meals. As students grow older they take on greater responsibility for composting, planting, harvesting, measuring, recording, and planning experiments. Finally, in the fifth and sixth grades, students assist in preparing school lunches, including cooking, menu planning, and nutritional analysis.

Second, Independent Study is a parent-involved program consisting of a blend of three days per week of classroom learning and two days per week of home study supplemented by three parent-organized field trips per month. The classroom learning is focused on the core academic areas of Language Arts and Math. This focus allows parents to reinforce material as needed and focus on science, social studies, the arts, and P.E. Many parents enjoy the balance between full homeschooling and classroom-based instruction. The school also offers a full home-schooling alternative that is supported by a credentialed teacher.

Third, Pacific School is one of few public schools to maintain an active Gifted And Talented Education (GATE) program. Students identified as appropriate for GATE receive supplemental instruction designed to challenge and excite them about learning, as well as have the opportunity to advance at an accelerated rate through the mathematics curriculum.

In addition to these unique programs, Pacific School's outstanding preschool and elementary classrooms emphasize experiential learning in an adult-rich, respectful, supportive environment, in keeping with the school's Mission and Vision Statements. All students benefit from Pacific School's commitment to a well-rounded hands-on, project-based education, including consistent instruction throughout the grades in technology and media literacy and music. In 2019-20, we fully integrated the FOSS science curriculum, which supports students in all grades in directly observing, discovering, thinking, exploring, modeling, and engineering. Various after school activities further enrich students' experiences at school, as well as provide options for working and busy families. Pacific School accepts a limited number of out-of-district students, based on space available and the school's New Family Enrollment policies.

Finally, much of what is essential to the quality of education at Pacific School, including many of the Enrichment Programs, are funded by the efforts and donations of Pacific School's Parents' Club and the Friends of Food Lab. State and federal funding is insufficient to support these programs, so the programs are dependent on the support of parents, volunteers, and community members for their continued success.

Reflections: Annual Performance

A reflection on annual performance based on a review of the California School Dashboard (Dashboard) and local data.

The Dashboard shows measurable results in 4 areas: CAASPP English Language Arts, CAASPP Mathematics, Suspension Rate, Chronic Absenteeism Rate:

The CAASPP English Language Arts was rated 3 out of 5 (yellow), which is average.

The CAASPP Mathematics was rated 4 out of 5 (green), which is high.

The Suspension Rate was rated 5 out of 5 (blue), which is excellent.

The Chronic Absenteeism was rated 3 out of 5 (yellow), which is very average and improved from the previous year's red rating. While the absenteeism rate declined by 11% from the previous year, it is still 21% and continues to be an area of concern. To improve attendance, Pacific will do the following:

- Analyze attendance data each month

- Send the appropriate attendance letters to the parents of students who have low attendance

- Include messages re the importance of attendance in the weekly parent memo

- Use the county's School Attendance Review Board, as appropriate

- Incentivize students to attend school by offering an engaging curriculum

In all other areas (Basics, Academic Standards, Parent & Family Engagement, Local Climate Survey, Access to a Broad Course of Study), the Dashboard shows that the standard was met.

The local data include report cards, writing rubrics, reading assessments, math assessments, disciplinary trips to the office. Patterns in the data indicate classic achievement gaps. Students with disabilities score lower than students without disabilities. English learners score lower than native English speakers. Whites score higher than Latinos. Very few students have multiple disciplinary incidents, while the overwhelming majority of students never have a disciplinary issue.

Many students, staff, and parents offer opinions, suggest ideas, and discuss questions on a daily basis.

A description of how the adopted LCAP was influenced by the feedback provided by educational partners.

Everyone's opinions help shape the final document before it goes to the board for approval. We engaged with our educational partners to develop an ATSI plan to support student groups who are eligible based on the 2023 dashboard. At our School Site Council (SSC)/ Parent Advisory Council (PAC) meeting, we asked parents and community members to share their recommendations for resources and services to meet the needs of student groups. Specifically, the SSC agreed that the attendance data is concerning, and that chronic absenteeism should continue to be a focus. There has been an increased use of short-term independent studies contracts as a result of these conversations. The SSC/PAC also had many questions about inadequate funding and the need for facilities repair. Some expressed concerns about the inadequacy of the FIT instrument in terms of measuring the true needs. As a result, the school has pursued funding outside LCFF and forged ahead with facilities repair despite the high scores on the FIT.

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

Our students engage in school in different ways, and it is vitally important that we provide avenues for each child to find meaningful opportunities to enjoy and succeed in school. Some are more academically oriented, while others have stronger interest in non-traditional activities. When we find a way to reach everyone, all of our students will be able to feel like school has something desirable to offer them, and they will be more likely to succeed because of that.

Our attendance and truancy data indicate that Pacific needs to redouble efforts to attract students not only to enroll, but also attend school. While elementary students don't control their attendance to a significant degree, creating programs that make students want to attend school will help improve our attendance and truancy data.

To help English Learner (EL) students, Pacific will offer an integrated ELD approach in which ELs experience an environment rich in opportunities for vocabulary development. While our ELs have made progress, RFEP rates and growth targets are below expectations. We need to create an ELD program that shows greater results for more students. The actions below are designed to benefit ELs throughout the school day.

The actions listed below were selected to help the school meet the goal of engaging all students. The metrics are designed to help the school determine the extent of our success in these endeavors. Students are more likely to be successful when their parents are also involved and engaged with the school, hence we offer opportunities and encouragement to get involved in their child's schooling.

There were no changes that meaningfully impacted the expected outcomes, strategies, or services provided to students. The following actions were fully implemented: 1.1 Food Lab, 1.2 Foster Youth Coordinator, 1.3 Newsletter, 1.4 Home Visits, and 1.5 Attendance Monitoring. The following actions were not implemented: 1.6 Student Surveys (because it is done every other year, and this was an off year) and 1.7 Attendance Training.

Educational research indicates that the classroom teacher is the most important factor in student success. Toward that end, Pacific intends to recruit the best candidates, train them to be the most effective that they can be, and then retain them so that Pacific's students continue to benefit from their professional skill set. Turnover, on the other hand, is costly in terms of time, resources, and educational benefit. Some of Pacific's students, and even more of Pacific's parents, are monolingual Spanish-speakers. Ensuring that they feel a sense of belonging by having bilingual staff is effective. The actions below are designed to attract, develop, and retain the best staff.

There were no changes that meaningfully impacted the expected outcomes, strategies, or services provided to students. All actions were fully implemented: 2.1 Ed Join, 2.2 Raising a Reader, 2.3 Facilities Maintenance, 2.4 Professional Development, and 2.5 Stipends.

There were no changes in the LCAP that significantly affected how funds were allocated or how goals, actions, and services were implemented.

Using EdJoin helped us hire qualified teachers. Using the Raising-a-Reader program helped students gain access to books to read at home. There are more maintenance tasks than funding, but every allocated dollar helps. PD helps teachers to be more effective. Targeted stipends help increase attraction and retention of desirable skills. All of these expenditures enabled us to make progress toward the goal.

- **4. Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (LCFF Funds)**
 - This amount is the total of the Planned Expenditures for Contributing Actions (LCFF Funds) column.
- **5. Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services**
 - This percentage is the total of the Planned Percentage of Improved Services column.
- **Planned Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the coming school year (4 divided by 1, plus 5)**
 - This percentage is calculated by dividing the Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (4) by the Projected LCFF Base Grant (1), converting the quotient to a percentage, and adding it to the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5).

Contributing Actions Annual Update Table

Pursuant to EC Section 42238.07(c)(2), if the Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (4) is less than the Estimated Actual LCFF Supplemental and Concentration Grants (6), the LEA is required to calculate the difference between the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5) and the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (7). - **8. Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (%)**
 - This amount is the total of the Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services column.
- **Difference Between Planned and Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (Subtract 5 from 8)**
 - This amount is the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5) subtracted from the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).

LCFF Carryover Table

- **10. Total Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the Current School Year (6 divided by 9 plus Carryover %)**
 - This percentage is the Estimated Actual LCFF Supplemental and/or Concentration Grants (6) divided by the Estimated Actual LCFF Base Grant (9) plus the LCFF Carryover – Percentage from the prior year.
- **11. Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (7 divided by 9, plus 8)**
 - This percentage is the Total Estimated Actual Expenditures for Contributing Actions (7) divided by the LCFF Funding (9), then converting the quotient to a percentage and adding the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).
- **12. LCFF Carryover — Dollar Amount LCFF Carryover (Subtract 11 from 10 and multiply by 9)**

- If the Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (11) is less than the Estimated Actual Percentage to Increase or Improve Services (10), the LEA is required to carry over LCFF funds.

The amount of LCFF funds is calculated by subtracting the Estimated Actual Percentage to Increase or Improve Services (11) from the Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (10) and then multiplying by the Estimated Actual LCFF Base Grant (9).
